Testimony as a Pramana?

Active Review

1. Sometimes, people make arguments by analogy. Here's an example:

Premise 1: Earth is a planet.

Premise 2: Mars is like Earth in all the relevant respects.

Conclusion: Therefore, Mars is also a planet.

For this question, I would like you to generate another example of an argument by analogy. Please make sure your example meets two criteria:

- (a) Instead of 'Earth' and 'Mars', use items from your group's category.
- (b) In your example, the second premise and conclusion must both be false.

2. This week's reading and lecture involved one important argument by analogy.

Premise 1: Perception is a pramana.

Premise 2: Testimony is like perception in all the relevant respects.

Conclusion: Therefore, testimony is a pramana.

For this question, I would like you to assume that Premise 1 is true. Then, I would like you to generate objections to Premise 2. In other words, what disanalogies might exist between perception and testimony, such that perception is a pramana but testimony is not? You may draw on ideas from the reading, the lecture, or your own mind.
